TT's TOP TURNING for this week



A very special clock skillfully and patiently made by **DAVID ROSE.**David has used resin infill with inlaid rimu wood dots to indicate the digits. A quartz clock mechanism with a 22mm shaft has been snugly fitted to the rear. The clock's features generate lots of interest with see-through resin and a good balance of shape and colour.

David's well-made turning project gets this week's big tick (tock)

This week's wood - Box Elder

Common Name(s): Box Elder, Boxelder Maple, Manitoba Maple, Ash-

leaved Maple Scientific Name: Acer negundo

Distribution: North America (most commonly in central and eastern

United States)

Tree Size:35-80 ft (10-25 m) tall, 1-2 ft (.3-.6 m) trunk diameter

Color/Appearance: Sapwood is a pale white, sometimes with a yellow/green hue similar to Yellow Poplar. The heartwood is a grayish/yellowish brown, frequently with red or pink streaks. The red stain is produced by the tree's natural defenses when wounded—it is thought that this compound is meant to inhibit the growth of fungus (Fusarium solani) that commonly colonizes the tree. Much of the reddish coloring becomes a more subdued pink or brown/gray upon drying.

Grain/Texture: Grain is straight, with a fine even texture. The growth rings are usually faint and non-distinct.

Rot Resistance: Poor durability, rated as non-durable to perishable. Heartwood is subject to heart rot and insect attack.

Workability: Easy to work with both hand and machine tools. Turns, glues, and finishes well.

Odor: Box Elder has a distinct and unpleasant scent when wet, which mostly subsides once dry.

Allergies/Toxicity: Box Elder, along with other maples in the Acer genus have been reported to cause skin irritation, runny nose, and asthma-like respiratory effects. See the articles Wood Allergies and Toxicity and Wood Dust Safety for more information.

Common Uses: Turned objects, small ornamental objects, wood pulp, charcoal, boxes, and crates.



Acer negundo is a species of maple native to North America. In Canada it is commonly known as Manitoba maple and occasionally as elf maple. Box elder, boxelder maple, ash-leaved maple, and maple ash.

Club fun project - "Salt/ Pepper Mill Creations"

The project got underway on Tuesday with participants choosing either the standard or crush-grind mechanisms. Square-section wood blocks were quickly transformed into cylinders then **27mm X 40mm spigots** were fashioned at the head end. Next came the tricky part of boring the holes into the end grain timbers. Success with this stage was dependent on a number of vital aspects as follows:

Everyone was reminded

about the NEED to use only the sharpest tools.

- 1). Ensuring the lathe was aligned before starting work.
- 2). Precise shaping of the spigot at the head end.
- 3). Correct fitting of the spigot into a chuck fitted with 35mm spigot jaws. Smooth spinning with no wobbles.

Note: If (2) and (3) had been done with accuracy then the next steps involving hole drilling posed fewer problems. Wobbling wood was difficult to drill accurately!!!!

- 4). Parting off techniques were revisited. (improving cut quality)
- 5). Jam chucks suitable for each style of mill were made (Tutor provided a demonstration of making a chuck-threaded model) *Work is in progress.*
