OK Here's THE FIRST INSTALMENT about a real sticky subject. GLUES

Wood glues are for joining/holding woody things together, repairing broken woody bits, or helping to fill cracks or holes in woody projects.

So which glue is best for which job?

How many types of glues are there?

Well there are at least five types and many variations of each type.

Funny how all manufacturers claim their product is the best. I wonder how they know.

Of the five types I will briefly cover a few ideas of just three.

- 1. Polyvinyl acetate (PVA) which is probably the most widely used glue by us woodies.
- 2. **Epoxy** which comes on two parts (two-pot glue)
- 3. Cyanoacrylate (CA- "Super" glue)

Let's start with **PVA glue.** Availability is no problem. This glue is sold everywhere and there are many brands, some like "Aquadhere" or "Titebond" are waterproof and great for applications where moisture could be a problem. One nuisance factor about PVA is spillage, because where ever PVA makes contact with the wood, any finish you want to apply can't seep through the thin layer of spilled PVA. So before you apply any finish you must make sure that all traces of the excess PVA have been sanded off.

A thick paste of PVA and wood dust is great for filling holes or cracks.

EPOXY works with a resin and a hardener. When mixed together a chemical reaction occurs and the mixture cures. (it hardens as hard as). There are many varieties and formulae devised to vary the hardening times. This stuff is excellent for filling holes or gaps in wood. It will sand and polish OK as well.

CA "Super Glue". Can you remember the earliest of TV advertisements about super glue holding the weight of an elephant? If you are in a hurry you can hasten the drying time by spraying the glued joint with an accelerant.

At the club we keep a product purchased from Terry Scott – "Starbond". Available in a range of viscosities – thin, medium-thin, medium, thick- gel etc.
