
DAVID Mollekin turned a lamp stand this week. Our new turners should take the time to watch David skillfully use his self-made turning tools that remove wood quickly and with ease.

Induction Programme for our new turners

Session One

- Introduction to the lathe
- Lathe alignment
- Practice with the roughing gouge
- Practice with the 10/13mm bowl gouge
- Turning a square section into a round
- Creating a spigot for a 35mm-jawed chuck
- Creating a spigot for a 25mm brass ferrule
- Creating decorative lines for burning

Introduction to basic skills using a variety of tools.

Primarily an introduction and practice session.

Session two

- Using the roughing gouge to turn a square section into a round
- 28mm spigot at one end
- Sketch plan the knockout bar tool handle
- Fitting the spigot to the 35mm chuck
- Create a spigot to fit a brass ferrule at the other end of the round
- Shaping the handle
- Drilling a 10mm hole 65mm deep in the handle
- Sanding to a smooth finish
- Introduction to EEE application to the handle, (masking tape !!) then polish
- How to part off using the parting tool
- Cleaning up the part-off cut surface
- Fitting the metal bar to the handle
- Introduction to the Beale polishing system

TOOLS to be used during this session:

(2) 10 and 13mm bowl gouges

(4) the parting tool

A notebook idea. Create a journal of your woodturning activity. Record aspects of ideas you find useful during each session.

- (1) the roughing gouge
- (3) the scraper
- (5) Jacob's chuck

Session three

- Tool sharpening training commences
- Band saw training commences
- Projects BUD VASE (one small and one larger)
- Skill work : Creating the classic "S" shaped flowing lines (models provided)

Session four

- Tool sharpening training continues
- Band saw training continues
- Project a **DIBBER**
- Introduction to use of mini tools to create special effects on the handle grip.
- EEE and the Beale polishing system training revised

Session five

- Project: **PAPER POTS MAKER**
- Tool sharpening training continues
- Band saw training continues

This project involves turning a squaresection length into a round then creating a 28mm spigot at both ends BEFORE the project shaping begins

• Project will be created from a set of models with a minimum of direction from the tutor.

Session six

• FREE CHOICE project

This project will be based on the turner's individual preference. The project chosen should involve a mix of any of the skills covered to date.

NOTE: Many of the procedures and tool skills for this project will have been covered in session two.

This project involves turning a slightly longer square-section length into a round before the shaping begins.

Session seven

Project: Turning a SMALL BOWL

- Finding the centre of a rough cut round using a centre finder
- Fitting a face plate
- Face plate (bowl) turning
- External and internal spigot making
- Power sanding techniques



Session eight

Project: BOWL TURNING continued

This project will involve further face plate turning for BOWL making.

Enhancement work may involve the use of a Dremel tool or a pyrographic burner tool

Session nine

Project: PEN MAKING

In this session you will complete a 7mm Slimline pen. Select the wood of your choice and, using the band saw, cut a 18- 22mm square section length about 130mm long

Session ten

Project: Another free choice activity to consolidate the skills covered to date


