

A most useful and practical project.


Love the safety aspect.

TURNING a LIGNUM VITAE LAWN BOWL

A new turning challenge: Recommended turner skills level: Intermediate to experienced

Special sale conditions: Orders along with payment of **\$10** for these wooden bowls will be taken in the week beginning 5th August . If there are more than 19 orders we will draw names out of the hat for the lucky 19 winners. The bowls will then be distributed at each of the three sessions in the week beginning 12th August.

To enable on-the-spot help for everyone the turning of your choice will be started immediately at that session of that week. However, if the project is not completed the turning can be continued at home.

Among the other usual items you have in your tool bag you will need:

- 1. A chuck screw
- 2. A standard 50mm jawed chuck
- 3. Super sharp gouges

Due to the scarcity of these vintage lawn bowls this opportunity is very likely to be never repeated. In fact, it may be your only chance ever, to work with a rare lignum vitae wooden lawn bowl.

PLANNING and DESIGN - the tutor's advice

Quotable Quotes highly applicable to what we do (or don't do) with our wood turning projects.

"A goal without a plan is just a wish."

So what have those wise words to do with wood turning? Plenty! OK you have a block of flawless wood and you are dead keen to turn out a special project. You bung it on the lathe and begin removing wood. You aren't really sure what you want to make but the wood is flying off the block anyway. OK you make a spigot 'cos that's what you always do. Nah...the spigot looks too small so you make a bigger one now. Um.... What shall I make....Um... In a short while there are shavings all over the workshop floor and you still haven't decided where you are going with this project. "By failing to prepare you are preparing to fail"


Good wood is getting more difficult to come by. Know where you are going with your project. Get that CONCEPT out of your head and turn it into a VISUAL. Make a drawing or two on your mini-blackboard. *"Give me six hours to chop down a tree and I will spend the first four sharpening the axe."*

When your **INITIAL THINKING** has been converted into a set of visuals you should begin your **PROCESS** planning.

Which part of your wood block will be the top/bottom of your turning? What size face plate will you need? What size spigot (if any). What jaws will you be working with? Will you need to align your lathe? What tools will you require? *"Always plan ahead. It wasn't raining when Noah built the ark."*

One of our Wednesday session members, **MITCHELL JURY**, is particularly focused on **CONCEPT planning** and is continuing to develop his strength in this vital approach to turning projects. Great work Mitchell!

I see my role is more in helping Mitchell develop his **PROCESS planning.**





MICHAEL used a block of redwood to fashion this bowl. After turning the winter growth rings became more prominent and appeared as small ridges across the turning. The spring/summer growth rings are less stable.

A vacuum flask made from pohutukawa wood, **ALEX** needed to make some critical measuring and turning for this project.

A mighty fine achievement here.
