

HOW TO SHARPEN A SKEW CHISEL



There are reasons why our skews are the least used tool in our lathe racks. (?????)

However, it's time to blow off the cobwebs and become familiar and confident with this wonderful turning tool.



OK go to Google

- (1) Type: "Sharpening a skew chisel You Tube"

 Click on any of the video (2.44) and watch the process used by the presenter.
- (2) Then type: "How to Sharpen the Woodcut oval skew" (3.19) Observe the technique as presented by Terry Scott and note the advice about jig settings.


