Note how David is able to transform the bark inclusions into an interesting feature in the turning.

Kohekohe is a medium-sized tree native to New Zealand. It is found in lowland and coastal forests throughout most of the North Island and also occurs in the Marlborough Sounds in the north of the South Island. Mature trees grow up to 15m in height, with a trunk up to a metre in diameter.






RICHARD's experimental goblet with its casuarina wood base and "Cow dung" stained stem. This chestnut wood bowl is really special!

You do? OK bring them to next week's turning sessions for a special project involving wood veneers incorporated into bowl turning.


