This week's TOP TURNING

SAM MANN hasn't yet finished his first woodturning course and already he is showing potential for woodturning skills mastery. Black walnut was a great choice of wood for his first serious attempt at making a bowl. Excellent shape and finish to a top job. **Goodonya Sam!**

The transition from rim, down the undercut side and across the bottom has been particularly well done.



SPECIAL TURNING

DAVID ROSE's cleverly-crafted, interesting blackwood turning incorporating a Maori symbol of intertwined koru depicting "mangopare" (Hammerhead shark)

This symbol of carved rimu wood has been set in a base of clear resin. This project demanded smart thinking and skillful turning. Another "Goodonya" David!

WORKSHOP SAFETY aspect.

WOOD SEALER: I am often asked about the process for sealing wet wood. Too often wood is brought into the workshop that is riddled with cracks (checks). This wood will make great firewood but is a bit useless for bowls etc. I work on the rule that if a tree is cut down on Saturday morning then it should be processed into logs, blocks or blanks, complete with sealer applied by the same Saturday evening. Checking will be minimal and your future wood supply will be more assured. Maybe you should buy a litre of this product from our club now!

Dale Nish 1932-2013



A bit of interesting history here





Dale Nish - one of the world's leading experts and proponents of woodturning.

Dale Nish started turning when he was about 14 years old at high school. Just like in the New Zealand education system in those days boys did workshop and girls did cooking and sewing.

Dale saw his first electric lathe in the school woodwork workshop parked in a corner and the story goes that even the teacher didn't know how to use it. So Dale and his teacher used a book *Getting The Most Out of Your Lathe* as a guide and they learned together through completing the projects outlined in the book.

Dale graduated from high school in 1951 and this was also the year that he married Norene, on 3 October, although she passed away in September, 2011. Dale was interested in learning and improving his qualifications and decided to go to university. Later he obtained a license to teach primary school aged children.


Later he transferred to Spring Coulee. He spent two years there as Principal of the school, teaching seventh to ninth graders *(children aged between 13 and 16 years old)*.

At the end of two years, Dale decided he needed more education, so in 1954 he went to Brigham Young University (BYU) in Utah. He gained a master's degree in technical education in 1958.

1983 saw Darrel - Dale's son figured that there was the potential for a mail-order business to service woodturners in the USA and that this was a good idea.

Craft Supplies USA was duly set up by Darrel. He and his mother worked together in the early days and over time it developed into the company it is today.



In my lounge Dale's Book "Creative Woodturning" is always within arm's reach to remind me of the basics of turning wood. A most excellent publication.

A Healthier Spot


Members of the Tuesday team helped me install a set of cupboards with shelves to accommodate the morning tea paraphernalia.
