

At last night's scheduled committee meeting there was lots of discussion about the re-opening date for our workshop to allow the resumption of the thrice-weekly turning sessions.

Tentative plans were espoused about ensuring members' safety, including social distancing, sanitizing, hand washing with hot soapy water, disinfecting communally-used tools and machinery and contact tracing procedures. It was decided to wait until the government's scheduled review of the Level 2 period and get some steerage from that review.

A tentative agreement was reached. IF AT ALL POSSIBLE, and DEPENDENT on any new REQUIREMENTS there is a chance that TUESDAY 2nd June could be the date for reopening. Do not take this as being definite, do wait until it becomes official.
