TERRY has a really wide range of items to support your turning projects and can assist in many ways. In an effort to streamline purchasing arrangements and assist those members who cannot readily make the trip up the motorway to buy goodies, I have introduced an easy-to-follow ordering system. This will involve having a fellow member to collect your goods for you thus saving you courier costs. Ordering slips are on a clip attached to the store room door.

Many items produced by our club members in the past two years would impress judges of any competition. Your work is highly valued.

#### Categories:

Bowls Sponsored by Carbatec:

Wooden items which have been made into a bowl shape which may be decorated, coloured, textured, embellished or otherwise enhanced.

Hollow Forms/Vases Sponsored by Timberly:

Hollow forms are wooden items which have been made from a single piece of wood and hollowed while turning on a lathe through a hole which is significantly smaller than the diameter of the finished work. Vases are wooden items which are at least twice as high as they are wide and have been hollowed while turning on a lathe. Hollow forms and vases may be decorated with other materials.

Plates/Platters Sponsored by Carbatec:

Wooden items which have been turned to a plate/platter shape on a lathe and may be decorated with other materials. The height must not exceed 15% of the diameter eg a 400mm diameter piece must not exceed 60mm in height.

Domestic Ware Sponsored by Timberly and Joiners Magazine:

Wooden items which may be decorated with other materials. This includes items such as rolling pins, spoons/scoops, egg cups, goblets, salt/pepper shakers, egg timers, lamp stands, stools, bowls and any other wooden items the maker believes to be utilitarian in a domestic situation.

Lidded Boxes Sponsored by Rutherford Rede:

Any wooden item with a lid that fits into or over the body of the work to enclose a useable space within. Like Rutherford Rede, a lidded box is a great place for your keepsakes.

Ornamental Sponsored by Timberly:

Any ornamental sculptured or abstract item made principally of wood. The item may be embellished with other materials. This may be a carving; or carved, textured, or painted woodturning; or marquetry, intarsia; or scroll saw work which creates an ornamental item from one or many pieces of wood; or any other wooden item which the maker considers to be ornamental.

Natural Sponsored by Carbatec & Joiners Magazine:

Any single piece of wood, which may be turned on the lathe or shaped with other tools and retains a part of the natural surface of the wood as it was found, or after the bark has fallen off. First Prize
