Turning projects made by **RICHARD JACKSON**

A drop spindle, traditionally made of wood, has been used by many cultures for 9000 years. It consists of a shaft and a disc shaped whorl which provides weight and propulsion.

The shaft is given a sharp twist with the hand and as the spindle spins the fibres to be spun are teased out and fed to the "spin". The spun fibre is then wound onto the shaft and the process repeated.

The wood used in these examples are kwila, poplar, oak, and spalted oak.
