Do you need some good quality wood for your turning projects?
Our wood guru **COLIN McKENZIE** has in his drying room, **21 species of wood**, all of which are available for club members.

The blocks are ranked from: **DRY** – **PARTLY DRY** -- **GREEN** wet wood.

Ash, Cherry, Chestnut, Plum, Black Walnut, Lusitanica, Blackwood, Elm, Rewarewa, Poplar, Japonica, Evergreen Oak, Sequoia (has amazing red colour right through the wood), Walnut, Silverpine, Kowhai, Evergreen Magnolia, Hickory, Norfolk Pine, Scarlet Oak, and Bay Laurel (looks very interesting, a very heavy dense wood probably be 3 years before its ready).

As my drying room is now full it would be good if members could start taking some of it so I will have room for new species. **Naturally there is a small cost for the pieces, all of which goes to club funds.** All woods are available if anyone wants to wet turn something.

There is only one small catch, members will have to come to my place to get the wood, or two or three members could get together and car pool and come and collect a quantity.
