## Some details about COLIN/WENDY's Bed Project

This is a bed constructed from untreated pine bought from a friend, mostly 100x100, 100x50 and 150x50 timbers. The bed is 2.3 metres tall, each post made in 3 sections.

The 2 large sections of each post are approximately 90 cm and permanently joined with a 35 ml spigot and socket.

The finial section is attached with a hanger bolt and a nut epoxied into the surface to facilitate removal for transport.

The posts are fixed to the ends with mortice and tenon joints and to the side rails with purpose- made bed corner brackets.

The headboard is resawn 100 x 50 boards edge joined to make a 500 x 30 board, and shaped with a jigsaw and router

The biggest challenge was working with large 100 x 100 pine sections with far too many knots.

The longer pieces were turned on a Chinese lathe similar to that sold in Mitre 10 which we bought for \$80 and initially using a \$40 set of starter chisels.

All the finishing was done by Wendy, and it has taken 2 years to get to this stage, with many other projects being completed in between
